DCI Provides Stipends for Poor and Meritorious Students to Continue Their Education

A function for scholarship distribution was organized on August 22,

2011 at Bauphal Upazilla Auditorium. Upazilla Vice Chairman Mr. Samsul Haque attended as Chief Guest. Officials of different department and School teachers from different schools also attended.

We provided Tk. 5000 for each child as a stipend for admission in Higher Secondary Education. A total of thirty children received the stipend, and were selected based on their SSC results and family's financial condition. The fund for this scholarship was provided by Sharmeen Parvez (20 children) and Lora Chowdhury (10 children).

Supplies for Sun Children

The second round of Sun Child Sponsorship supplies was provided in the months of August and September. The supplies were given to children DCI's Patuakhali, Feni, Habiganj, and Nilphamary projects - 1100 children in total. Sponsored children receive a stipend for education, school uniforms, bags, shoes, education materials, and hygienic products. Teachers, quardians, and School Management Committee members were present for the distribution.

DCI's orphanage, the **Sun Child Home**, is at present housing 18 children. The main objective of the program is to allow orphans to grow properly with appropriate care and become productive, confident and self-reliant citizens in the future. Orphans receive lodging, healthcare, education, and all basic necessities at the orphanage. Recently the children visited Shishu Mela, a children's park, and also visited the Dhaka Zoo. Everyone had a lot of fun on this occasion.

"It was my dream for a long time to do something for unprivileged children, but I did not know how to go about it. Last year I got a call from Mukta, my friend who lives in Germany. She informed me about DCI and its organizer Dr. Ehsan Hogue. I went to the website immediately and found lots of information there. I was given an option to pick a child to sponsor. My son Teebro became even more interested than me to choose a child. He found a very sweet boy named Maruf Hossain, age six, who lives in Potuakhali. This year we had a plan to visit Potuakhali, when we were in Bangladesh, but we were very busy during our trip and had to drop the idea. I asked DCI's liaison officer Mr. Humayun whether it would be possible to bring Maruf to Dhaka for a visit. He made a quick arrangement and set up an appointment with me.

On June 25th we went to Mohammadpur to see Maruf Hossain. I was surprised to see such a nice and healthy boy - you can't even imagine. Under DCI's program he and his friends are getting a proper education and a regular check-up by an MBBS doctor. I was wondering how the children would get help with their homework when their parents are uneducated, and was surprised to hear that they also receive tutoring through an after-school program. I encouraged Maruf to get first place in his class. I want to conclude by saying that all of this is possible due to Dr. Ehsan and his team members' relentless effort. I am spending only few dollars a month, but the satisfaction I am getting in return is beyond measure."

Dr. Naima Naheed wrote her feelings in a guestbook—

It was a great pleasure to meet these children. They have lots of opportunities here. I had a dream to see such an organization. Today my dream is fulfilled.

Orphan Support Program

Ritu, a Street Child, Takes Shelter in DCI's Sun Child Home

It is truly unfortunate when a child is without parental care. When Ritu was 5 years old her father remarried and abandoned the family without providing any material support. Ritu's mother then remarried, but the step-father also left after some time. The mother took a job as a day-laborer. Most of the time she worked at night and Ritu stayed alone at home. Ritu had no chance to go to school and over time she became very physically weak. Ritu's mother again got married, but Ritu's new stepfather would not tolerate her, so she was sent away to work as a domestic servant.



Ritu's mother heard about DCI's Sun Child Home from ASD (a non-government organization). We gathered all types of information about Ritu. Her mother told us her history and she was very anxious about her daughter's future. We admitted Ritu to our home for orphans. Now she is going to school regularly. Besides her school and education she is drawing, dancing, singing, and playing with her friends.

In Bangladesh there are many unfortunate girls like Ritu. DCI is trying to remove them from these situations, but with our capacity we are only able to help a few girls from among thousands of unfortunate children. So many remain in dire conditions without a future, without even the dream of a better life.

Young Cowboy Becomes a Student



In this world it is difficult to imagine a situation more miserable than a child losing their mother. But perhaps even more ill-fated are those children who have a mother but are deprived of her contact through force of circumstance. The main cause of such circumstances is poverty. 11+ years old Ibrahim Hossain is a representative of this unfortunate population. He currently lives with his 60+ years old grandmother. When Ibrahim was two months old, his father abandoned their family. During that day his grandmother was very hopeless with her sick daughter and her kids. They had no income source to feed and provide treatment for Ibrahim's mother. "Having no alternative I had to sell my only arable land," says Ibrahim's grandmother. "After

losing everything I was involved in begging for us to survive."

Ibrahim's mother Runu Begum also sought work for income. But there was no opportunity in the village. When Ibrahim was 18 months old, she moved to the capital city of Dhaka and found work as a garments worker with the help of a relative. Ibrahim was left with his grandmother. Time passed with great difficulty for them. Ibrahim began work in the village as a cowboy when he was just 7 years old. The next year, DCI started its **Sun Child Sponsorship Program** in the nearby school, and after observing this family's desperate condition, included him in the program.

From that point Ibrahim began his education, and has received essential support from DCI such as school and hygiene materials, a stipend, and after school tutoring. Now Ibrahim is a student in Grade 4 and "he has no need to go work and we have no tension regarding his future," says his grandmother. Ibrahim can now realize the fullness of life and he is determined about his future. "I did not get any opportunity to live with my mother. Whenever I was ill, I longed for her so much, but there was nothing we could do," Ibrahim expressed with regret. "After completing my education I will get a job so that I can rescue my mother from garments work and stay close with her," he informed us with full confidence.

In Bangladesh, there are so many children like Ibrahim, who are growing up without parental care and in extreme poverty. They need to start work very early in their childhood and do not receive proper education. At present 10% of children never go to school due to poverty. They need our special attention.

We request all our DCI friends to take responsibility for the education of at least one child or orphan. They are our future leaders. We cannot conceive of a prosperous world while ignoring these vulnerable children. Together we can ensure the proper growth of such children and prepare them to be responsible and prosperous citizens.
